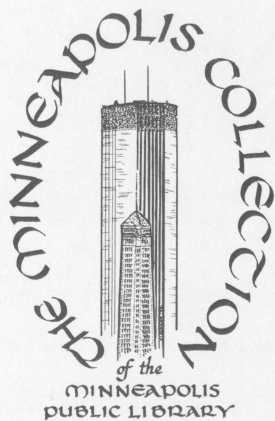

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

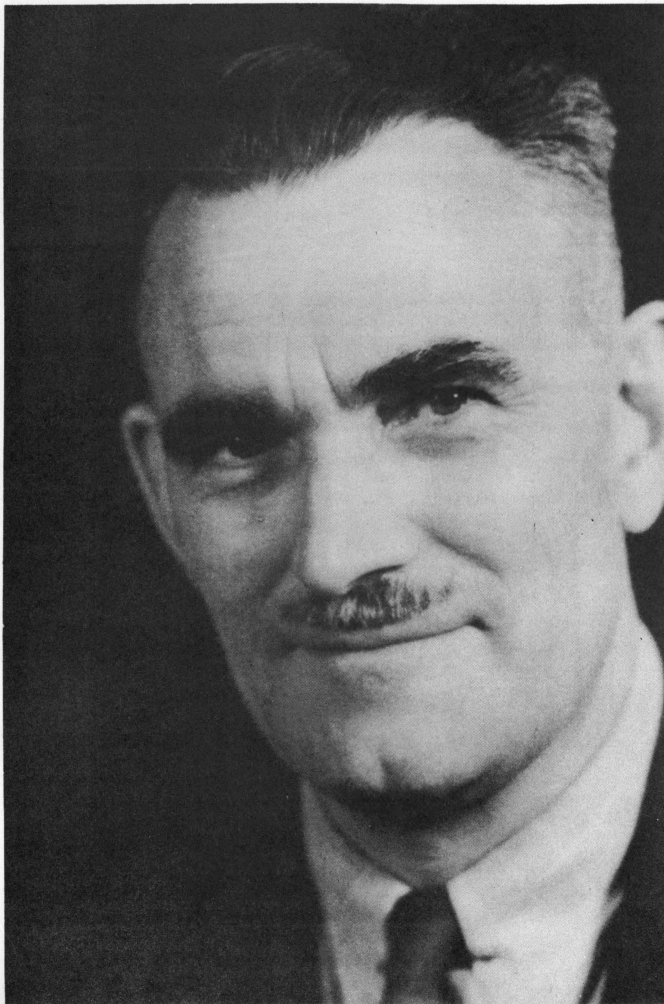
## AN APPRECIATION

# AUTO ELECTRICITY AND MECHANICS



Automobile construction, automotive engine work, lighting and radio equipment, chassis repair, and garage practice are some of the subjects studied by those in the Automobile Electricity and Mechanics departments. Any tenth grade students who have had one year of General Metals, may take these courses which train for employment as garage mechanics and battery, ignition, and car radio specialists.

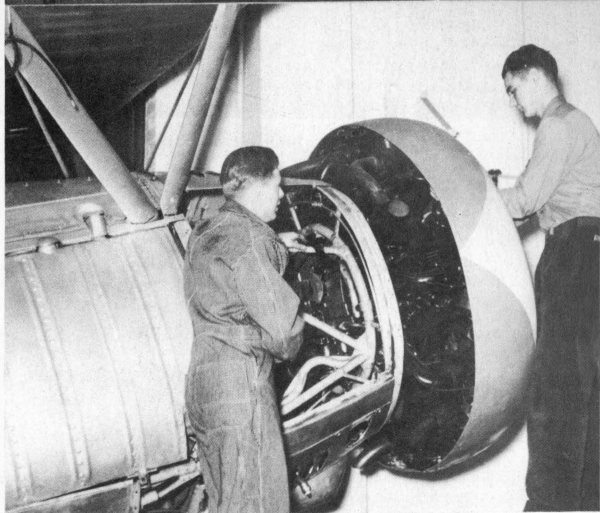

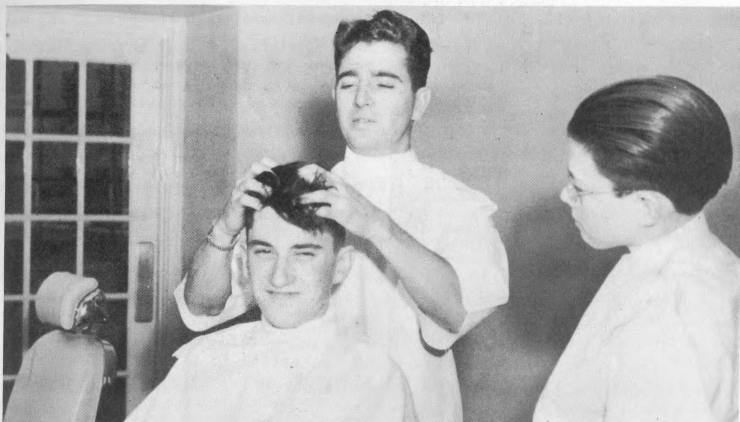

## BUSINESS

The Business Department, the largest in Vocational, gives training to one-fourth of the girls' school enrollment. Courses in multigraphing, typing, comptometry, telegraphy, bookkeeping, office training, English, and history are offered under the three general divisions: Stenography, General Business, and Telegraphy.

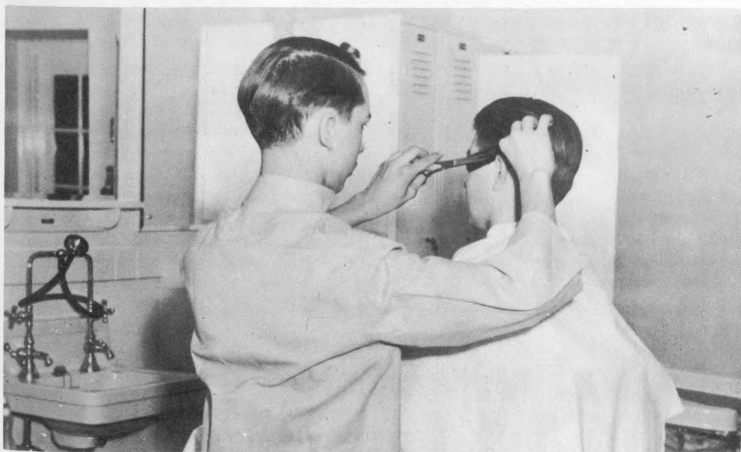
The purpose of the Business Department is to train pupils so that they will be able to meet the challenge of the business world. Last year Miss Henry, coordinator for the department, was able to place 300 students in positions. Of these, 100 were permanent and 200, temporary.

## BARBERING

Barbering, a new Department which started in the fall of 1940, is under the instruction of Mr. Robert R. Graham. Haircutting, shaving, and the giving of facials, shampoos, and hair treatments are included in the course. A specified number of practice hours is required of the students. At the completion of the course, they must pass a State Board examination.

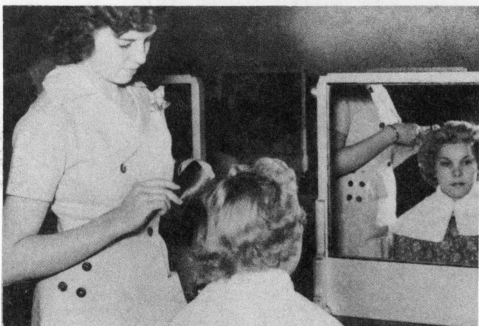

The Cosmetology Department teaches all branches of beauty culture such as scalp treatments, shampooing, finger waving, permanent waving, facials, and manicuring. This course includes a very thorough study in the theory of cosmetology. The training extends over a two-year period for undergraduates and one year for graduates. The Minnesota State Board of Hair Dressers requires one thousand hours of school training after which the student is required to pass the state board examination. Placement in this department is very good.

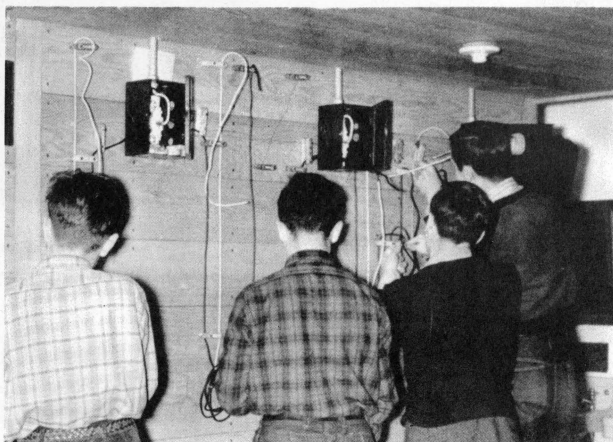

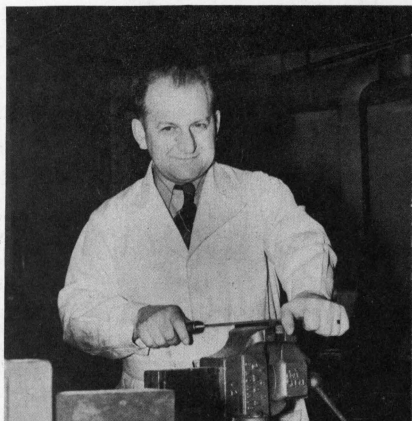

Since more building is being done, the demand for workers in housing electricity is rapidly increasing.

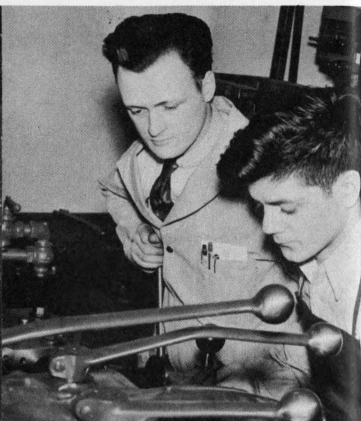

### A CLASS IN POWER MACHINE OPERATING

## NOVELTIES AND DISPLAY

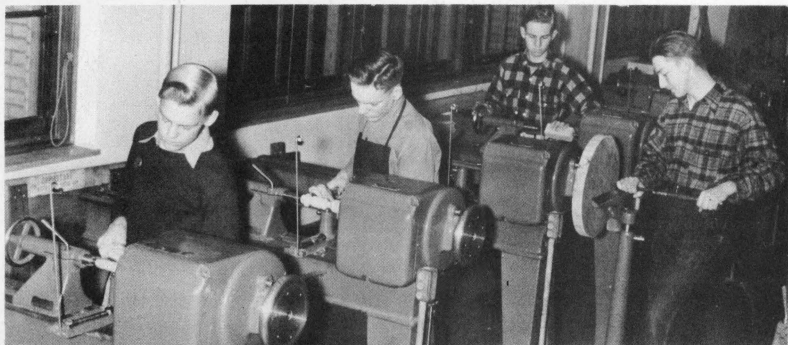

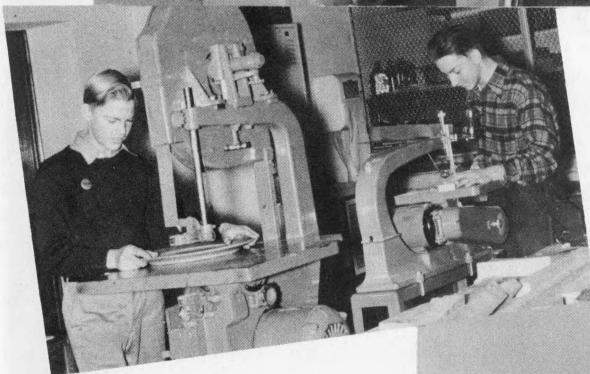

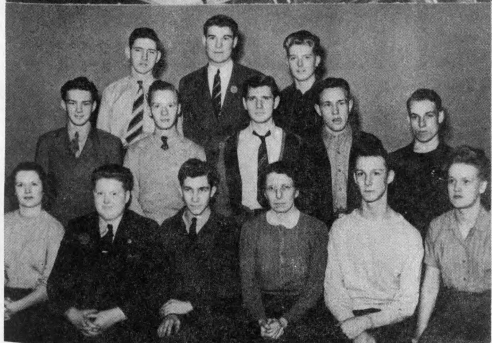

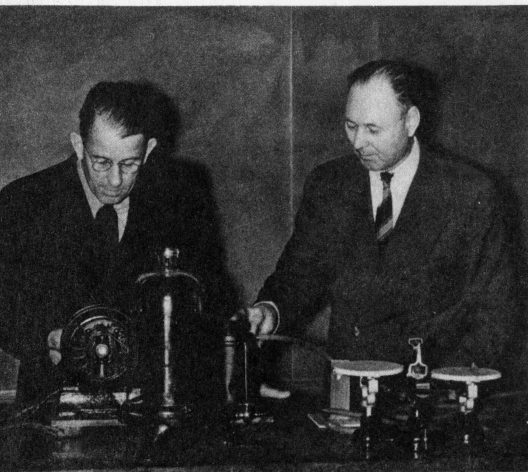

An additional course in mathematics closely related to their trades and leading to a high school diploma is taken during their fifth semester in the school.

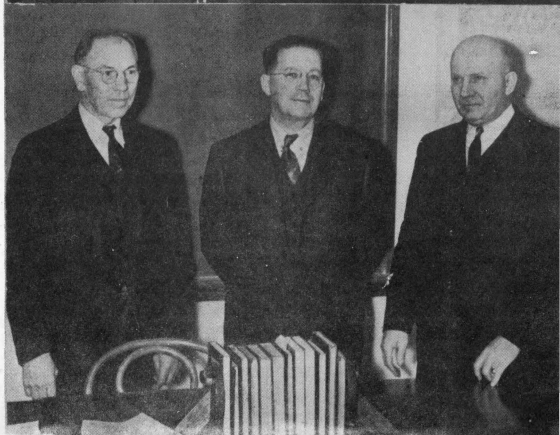

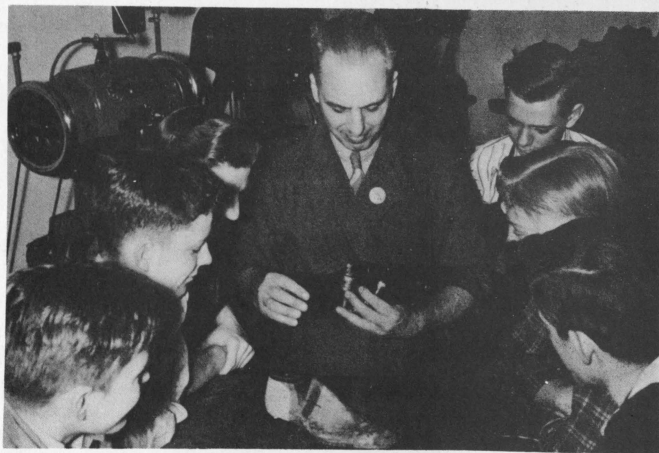
# SHOE REPAIR

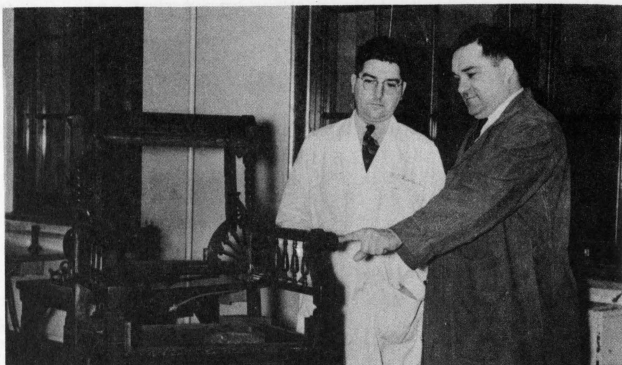

## TAILORING

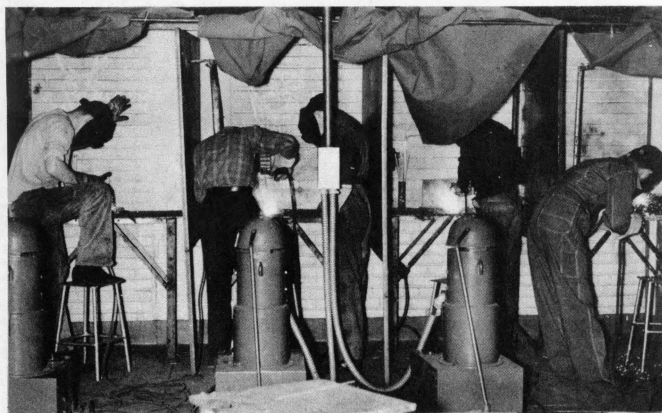
## UPHOLSTERING

Fundamental facts about materials and the development of individual abilities in furniture design, finishing, and sewing machine are especially stressed in the Upholstery Department.

Work for the public is done on regular modern overstuffed furniture which is reconstructed and recovered to give pupils practice in upholstering.

Placement of the advanced apprentices is high in the unlimited field of shops and retail stores.

Welding, introduced into the curriculum last fall as a part time course, was set up as a full department in January. The training includes the use of acetylene and electric arc welding. Upon completing the course, the boys will be expected to understand the uses of welding and the welding of such materials as steel, cast iron, brass, bronze, and copper.



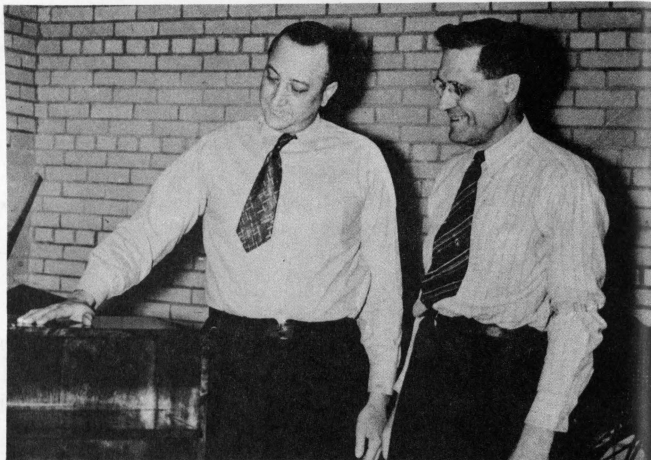

## WOODWORKING
