Academic Subjects

As in all high schools of Minneapolis, the students of Vocational must have academic work. Our diplomas are on the same level as other secondary schools and our graduates, too, may enter the university or colleges of their choice.

Among the academic subjects taught at Vocational are English, history, modern problems, science, Spanish, math, and music. Elective subjects are also offered at Vocational such as creative writing, radio workshop, and journalism—writing for the school paper.

Besides teaching the fundamental techniques of their subjects, the teachers of English, history, and modern problems classes prepare their students for good citizenship. Due to a constantly changing world, it is

necessary to gain a clearer knowledge, not only of our own country but of the different forms of government and cultures of other lands. Understanding, to an extent, other peoples of the world is one more step towards peace.

Classes that are especially important in their relation to the trades are science and math. Students are taught the basic fundamentals of these subjects as well as their relationship to the different trades. A knowledge of related subjects makes for more intelligent workers in the trade classes.

The graduates of Vocational High School are prepared to take their places in the community, not only as skilled workers, but as good citizens through the knowledge gained in the academic work.

Modern living demands specialization, skilled training, and good citizenship. If America's youth are to contribute successfully to their communities, they must fulfill these requirements.

Because Vocational is primarily a trade school, the emphasis for the students is on meeting this challenge. It is done here by offering a wide range of trades, counseling in the selection of a suitable trade for the individual, instruction in the fundamentals and skills of the crafts, and teaching the proper trade relations between employee and employer.

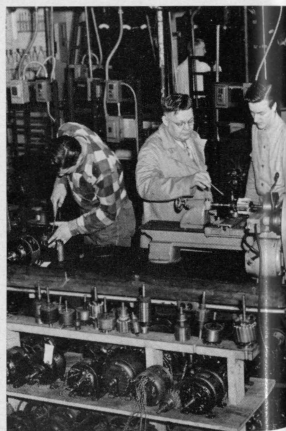
Vocational is more strongly related to in-

dustry than are the academic high schools. This is due largely to the part-time cooperative program set up by the State Department of Education. The plan provides practical on-the-job training for seniors in the trades in which they have had two years of instruction. Thus they become acquainted with shop and business rules before they begin their apprenticeships. This provides industry with low labor turnover, and a chance to choose the right individuals for suitable jobs.

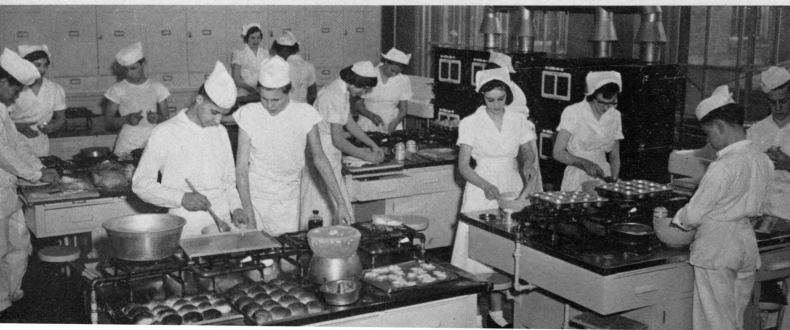
As a result of this training in the trade classes, Vocational's students are better prepared to serve their communities as proficient workers and educated citizens.

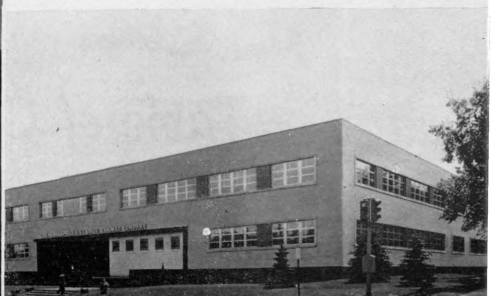
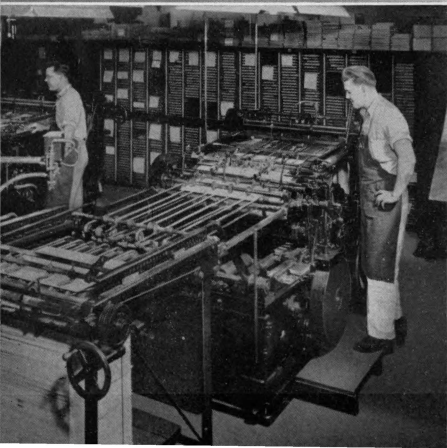
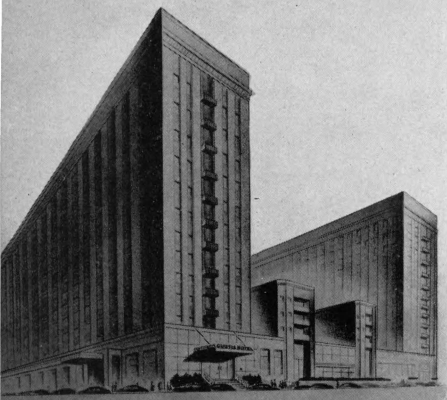
Vocational Serves the Community

Minneapolis Vocational High School and Technical Institute is one of the largest and most complete of all the community service organizations in the Northwest. It provides a source of learning for anyone desiring to extend his knowledge, obtain a high school education, or become a skilled craftsman in a specialized field. Because of these opportunities, the people who take advantage of them are prepared to benefit the community.

Vocational serves its community in innumerable ways. Aside from offering a general high school educational course, it meets the needs of Minneapolis and adjoining territory by remaining in operation fourteen hours at a time for day and evening classes. Special technical programs, not offered in any other secondary school, may be taken at Vocational. About 1500 day and 3500 evening students work harmoniously with 116 qualified teachers.

A Veteran's Rehabilitation Program, sponsored by the G.I. Bill, has met with great success here at Vocational. A rapidly growing Tech-high program is under way which allows regular high school students to come to Vocational for part of the day to learn a trade of their choice. A post-graduate course is also offered: Any high school graduate under twenty years of age may attend for one year, tuition free.

The school itself accommodates the public in many ways. All shops, including a tearoom, barber and beauty shops, shoe shop, and retail store, are open to benefit the community. Services are offered by various departments to repair such ob-

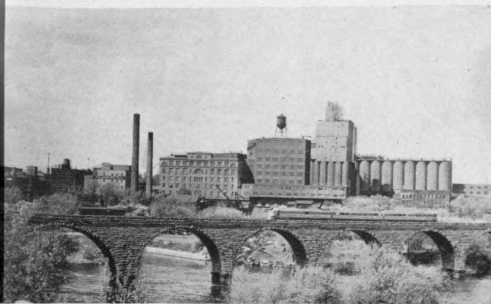
jects as radios, toasters, watches, autos, footwear and other necessary articles. Vocational furnishes the city's citizens with rooms for public meetings. It also is a voting center for two precincts.

Because of part-time work and co-op schedules, employers are enabled to look over and select desired personnel for full time employment upon graduation. These people welcome Vocational graduates because they are willing to work, are trained, and prepared to contribute their skills and knowledge to answer the needs of the community.

Students and graduates from numerous trades answer community needs as cooks in hotels, technical craftsmen in defense plants, mechanics for airlines and super stations, clerks in stores, assistant nurses in hospitals, office workers, secretaries, commercial artists, and in many other capacities. Students entering the armed forces are better able to benefit their country because of their specialized training for definite technical jobs.

Vocational's services are felt and used in many places. The printing department produces all of the printed matter, such as report cards, passes, forms, and commencement programs, that is issued through the school board. A widely distributed catalogue is busy advertising Vocational throughout the Upper Midwest and has gone to such places as Cuba and Chile. The school paper, **The Craftsman**, has submitted both information and photographic art to large newspapers such as the **Minneapolis Star**. Our year book, **The Tradewind**, is sent overseas to be studied and enjoyed by peoples of many countries.

The community we serve, an ever widening territory, may look to the Vocational High School and Technical Institute for students who with educated minds, skilled hands, and good citizenship, can meet its needs.

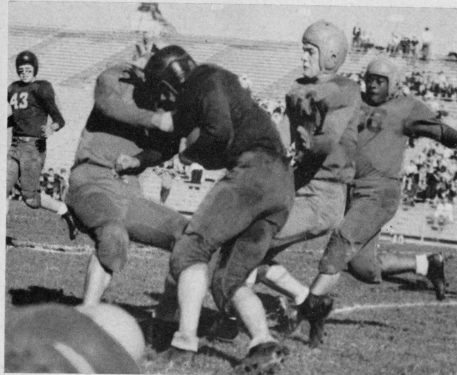
Football

Baseball

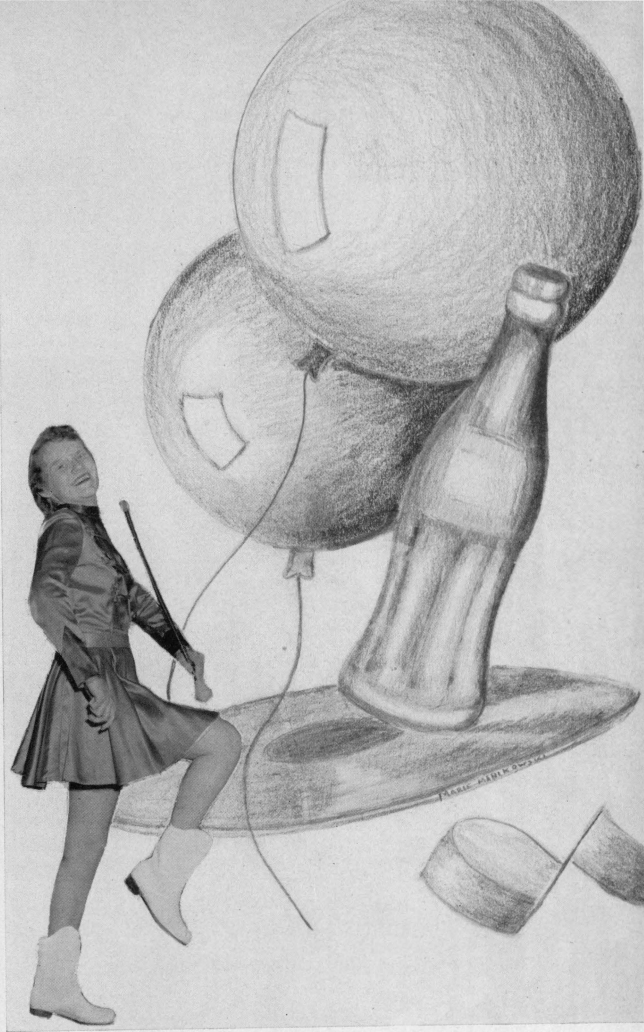

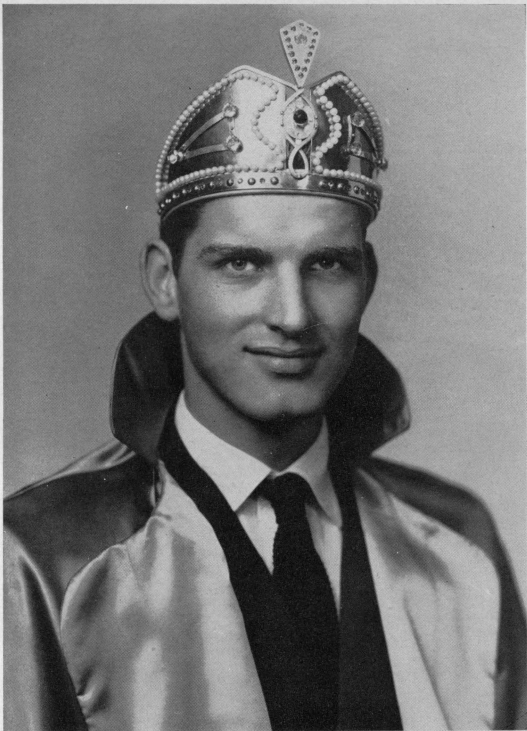
Cross Country

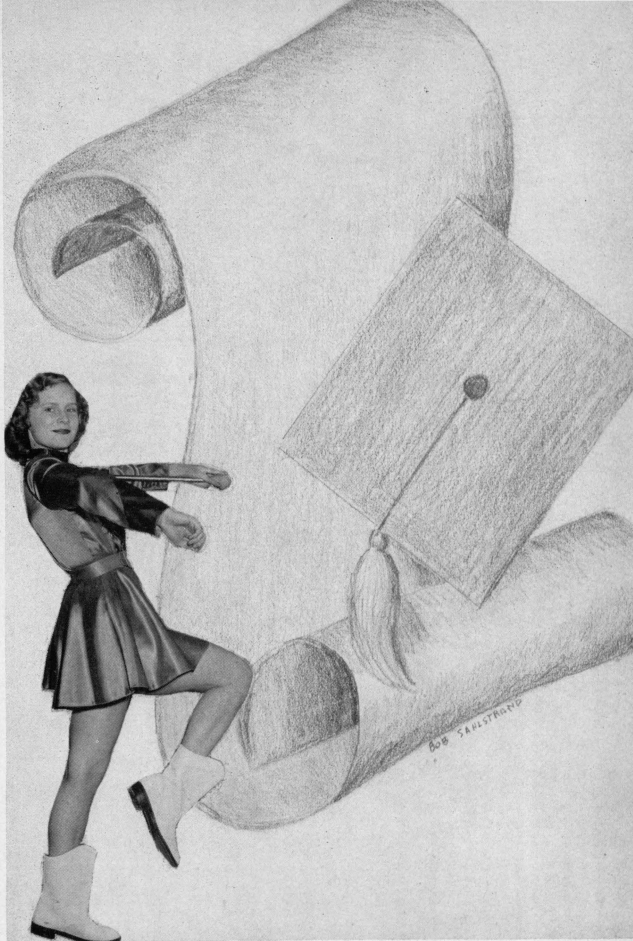
with their attendants rode around the field in convertibles. Al Haley led the procession in his brightly festooned Model "A" Ford.

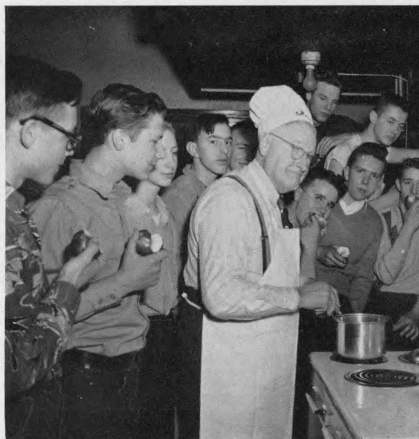
That afternoon, the Radio Workshop pre-
